Competing against more than 200 teams and 380 apprentices from across the globe, one of CORE's teams placed second in the hurtman rescue event, while one apprentice secured fifth place in the overall co-op division.

2025 Director elections in Districts 3, 5 and 7

As a member-owner of CORE Electric Cooperative, you have a voice. Members within each district elect a fellow member to serve a four-year term on CORE's Board of Directors and represent their interests in CORE business and policies. In 2025, the board seats for Districts 3, 5 and 7 are up for election.

To be eligible to become or remain a director, a person must:

- be an individual 18 years of age or older;
- be a member of the cooperative:
- purchase electric energy within his or her director district; and
- not be a current employee of the cooperative, or formerly employed by the cooperative within the past five years.

Eligible candidates who want to run for CORE's Board of Directors must submit a written petition signed by at least 15 members and submitted to CORE 60 to 90 days prior to election (Jan. 26 and Feb. 25). The petition signature of a spouse of a member is not counted unless the spouse is a joint member and the other joint member has not signed, or the spouse is a member in his or her own right.

Electronic voting will open and printed ballots will be delivered not less than 30 days before the annual meeting to members in any district in which there is a contested election. Eligible voters who do not vote electronically or via mail can vote in-person Saturday, April 26, between 9 and 10 a.m, at CORE's headquarters in Sedalia. Voting by proxy is not permitted in director elections.

Elections schedule

- Jan. 26, 2025: First day to submit director nomination petitions
- Feb. 25, 2025: Last day to submit director nomination petitions

- March 12, 2025: Last day to submit nominee bios and positions statements for inclusion in ballots
- Late March 2025: Electronic voting opens; printed ballots mailed to members who do not opt into electronic voting
- April 25, 2025: Deadline for all electronic and mail ballots to reach the independent election vendor
- April 26, 2025: Annual meeting and election

Preparing your home for the festive season

As the holiday season approaches, it's important to **prioritize safety when decorating with lights**. Before using last year's string lights, inspect them for frayed wires or damaged bulbs and replace any faulty strands. When replacing bulbs, ensure they match the original wattage and voltage to prevent overheating.

Always check for overhead power lines and maintain a distance of at least 10 feet when hanging outdoor lights. Use longer extension cords instead of multiple shorter ones to reduce overheating risks, and always plug outdoor lights into Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) outlets for added safety.

Following these guidelines will help you enjoy a festive and safe holiday season.
